A Simple Way to Strengthen Your Faith for The New Year



A new year, full of new possibilities. Maybe you want to lose weight, save money, or start an inhome business. You might want to run a 5k, go on a mission trip, or finish paying off a loan.

No matter what your ambitions are, you probably have a good idea of what you would like to accomplish this year. So, here's the question: Do any of your goals involve growing in your faith?

This does not mean that you have to read the entire Bible in a week or donate your entire paycheck to the next church campaign. But one of the things you can do, to grow in your faith, is simple: Practice gratitude. {grat·i·tude: Noun - The quality of being thankful; readiness to show appreciation for and to return kindness.}

Being thankful strengthens your relationship with God. If you don't understand how, think about it like this. When you do something for a loved one and they express gratitude for your efforts, you feel pretty good, right? You feel loved, understood and appreciated.

God doesn't need our appreciation, but when we look at all He has done for us, how can we be anything but grateful? He not only created a beautiful, mysterious world for us to explore, but He also created us. And He gave us His one and only Son to die for us so we could spend eternity with Him.

Those are some pretty big things to be grateful for! But it's tough to grow in thankfulness <u>unless</u> you have a plan in place. Here are some ideas on how you can keep gratitude at the front of your mind.

- ◆Invest in a journal and use it as a *Gratitude Log*. Make time each day to jot down a few things you're thankful for. You could do this on your phone, too, but a written journal, dedicated to tracking your blessings, makes the habit a bit more meaningful.
- ◆If you're married, you could share a journal and take turns writing down the things you're grateful for as a couple. Or you could make it a habit to spend a few minutes at the end of each day sharing the things you're thankful for.
- ◆Teach your children gratitude at an early age. Many kids learn well with visual aids, consider making a gratitude jar. It doesn't have to be fancy. Have everyone in the family write down one thing they're thankful for each day and drop it in the jar. You could use stickers for the little ones.

Whatever you do, find a way that will let you keep track of the things you're thankful for and make a point to look them over on a regular basis! Maybe you can read your gratitude log at the end of each month. Or you could come together as a family and spend some time reading over the blessings in the gratitude jar.

Making gratitude a habit will not only strengthen your relationship with the Lord, but it will also remind you just how blessed you are. Try it and see how wonderful the new year might be.

A Casual Walk Through Matthew's Gospel

(Matthew 1:1-17) Matthew begins by using a genealogy. It is a bit boring to read unless one is truly into seeing the family tree of our Lord. Howbeit, Matthew is doing something very significant. He is putting Jesus within the whole story of salvation! By showing a positive link between "the Son of Abraham, the Son of David," Matthew is telling us right off the bat that JESUS IS THE FULFILLMENT OF ALL THE PROMISES GIVEN TO GOD'S PEOPLE.

As if he wants to make sure readers grasp the point, Matthew wraps up the genealogical tree by very interestingly stating: (Matthew 1:17) "So all the generations from Abraham to David are fourteen generations; and from David to the deportation to Babylon, fourteen generations; and from the deportation to Babylon to the Messiah, fourteen generations."

Truly, Matthew's effort is outstandingly beautiful. Yes, the reading can be tedious but in spite of that there is a very important message for us. In addition to whatever else this genealogy says, it should smack us with the realization that God had planned for Jesus' birth from the early days of history and as God planned it, so it is.

Another significant fact is the name MESSIAH. The Hebrew people choose names for their offspring by what the names meant in relationship too God. We might choose a name that might honor a loved one, we call it "named after a person" or perhaps in honor of someone who is deceased. In my case, I've been told that my first name "Clyde" was the name of my dad's best friend when dad was in Mechanics School in Detroit, Michigan; my middle name "Homer" was chosen to honor my parents' neighbor, in whose house I was born.

The name "Messiah" and the name "Jesus" means savior. It is very significant that Mary and Joseph did not by themselves choose our Lord's name. In verse 21 when speaking to Joseph an angel of the Lord said, "You are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins."

The shortest pondering of the Gospel of Matthew should comfortably assure us that GOD is in control of the flow of life...whether life seems to be tough at the moment, or a rich blessing of joy. God is in control. Our goal should be to hang in there with God, be we thirsty or engulfed by flooding waters.

As we begin our casual walk through the Gospel of Matthew, we are reminded that history did not happen in a vacuum. God has been and is involved in all history—your history and my history. For sure, God is with us in the rising of the sun and its setting and every minute in between.

We will do well remembering the significance of the name given our Lord. Savior. STOP AND THINK ABOUT THAT A MINUTE. WHY? Because it should help us to keep ourselves closer to Jesus, our eternal LORD. This is one of the best ways to be cognizant that we are NEVER alone.

Our daughter, Cynthia E. Hadley, MD once said it this way: "To be like Jesus, take time to be with Jesus." Yes, to be in-tune with Jesus, walk with him in prayer, in your pondering of life, in reading God's Holy Word and in your action's day by day.

In the same way Matthew is reminding us that "If we seek we will find." And the seeking will grant us the experience of a strengthened relationship with God and the resulting peace and joy it affords all who seek.

Telehealth - Wyo. Co. Community Action

There is an exciting new program we have to offer here at Wyoming County Community Action.

Living in a remote area, we understand that not everyone has access to reliable internet access or the technology needed to support telehealth appointments. Telehealth has quickly become a sign of the times and for some providers, the preferred method of communication. We have added a telehealth room to our agency where a client can come in and access their remote appointments in a quiet and private environment. They will also have the option for one of our Care Coordinators to sit in on the appointment and be an advocate or an extra set of ears for the information discussed.

We are currently in partnership with Spectrum Health but have the ability to provide this service for any appointments the client may have. In extreme or emergency cases, we do have the capability to take this service on the road and meet up with the client at their home or say their local library. The safety of our staff is important to us. With that being said, we may travel in pairs or choose to decline a home telehealth appointment based on safety.

*We are working on adding a site in Arcade for the folks that live off that way. It should be up and running within a few weeks.
