Common Misconceptions About Christian Life

New Christians quite often have misconceptions about God, the Christian life and other believers. This look at some common misconceptions of Christianity is designed to dispel some of the myths that typically hinder all Christians from growing and maturing in the faith.

- Once you become a Christian, God will solve all your problems Many new Christians are shocked when the first trial or crisis hits. Here's a reality check get prepared the Christian life is not always easy! You will still face ups and downs. You will have problems and troubles to overcome. READ: 1 Peter 4:12-13
- Becoming a Christian means giving up all fun and following a life of rules A joyless existence of mere rule-following is not the true and abundant life God intends. Rather, this describes a man-made experience of legalism. God has amazing adventures planned for you. READ: Romans 14:16-18
- All Christians are loving, perfect people Well, it doesn't take very long to discover that this is not true. Although Christians strive to be like Christ, we will never obtain complete sanctification until we stand before the Lord. In fact, God uses our imperfections to "grow us" in the faith. If not, there would be no need to forgive one another. As we learn to live in harmony with our new family, we rub each other like sandpaper. It's painful at times, but the result brings about a spiritual smoothing and softening to our rough edges. READ: Colossians 3:13
- Bad things don't happen to truly godly
 Christians Often Christians begin to wrongly
 believe that if they live a godly Christian life, God
 will protect them from pain and suffering. READ:
 2 Corinthians 11:24-26 Some believe the Bible
 promises health, wealth and prosperity for all who

live a godly life. Not true! Jesus never taught this. You may experience these blessings in your life, but they are not a reward for godly living. At times we experience tragedy, pain, and loss in life. This is not always a result of sin, but rather, for a greater purpose that we may not understand. We may never understand, but we can trust God in these difficult times, and know he has a purpose. READ: 1 Peter 1:6-7

- Christian ministers and missionaries are more spiritual than other believers This is a subtle but persistent misconception that we carry in our minds as believers. Because of this <u>false</u> notion, we end up putting ministers and missionaries on "spiritual pedestals" accompanied by unrealistic expectations. When one of these heroes falls from our self-constructed perch, it tends to make us fall away from God as well. Don't let this happen in your life. READ: 1 Timothy 1:15-16
- Christian churches are always safe places, where you can trust everyone Although this should be true, it is not. Unfortunately, we live in a fallen world where evil resides. Not everyone who enters the church has honorable intentions. READ: 1 Peter 5:8 and Matthew 10:16
- Christians should not enjoy any earthly pleasures I believe God created all of the good, wholesome, enjoyable, and fun things we have on this earth as a blessing for us to enjoy. The key is not holding on to these earthly things too tightly. We should grasp and enjoy our blessings with our palms held open and tilted up. READ: Job 1:21
- Christians always feel close to God As a new Christian, you may feel very close to God. Your eyes have just been opened to a brand new, exciting life with God. However, we should all be prepared for dry seasons in our walk with God. They are bound to come. A life-long walk of faith requires trust and commitment even when you don't feel close to God. READ: Psalm 63:1 and Psalm 42:1-3.

Casual Walk Through Matthew's Gospel Part Two

This, our second month of casually walking through the Gospel of Matthew, finds us continuing the same portion of scripture. (Matthew 1:1-17) Matthew went at length to assure us that Jesus' birth was planned by God since the very beginning of creation, Jesus is a part of the family of all creation. He is part of your family, of mine and everyone's.

As I pondered that, my mind was stimulated to think about my own family and how very important it is to me. For example, I smiled as I remembered one cold winter morning going to my office in the church and finding a very colorful note from my then teenage daughter, Mary. The note had only three words had just three words: "AIN'T GOD GREAT." That shining note took the chill out of that cold morning. Mary knew what she wrote. She was then and still is very involved in the church. She knew the truth of her words and joyfully shared them with her dad, whom she knew was under a lot of pressure in his profession

at that time. Family relationships are so important.

Knowing that truth, Matthew wants to be sure we understand that Jesus is a part of all families. Matthew therefore includes a lengthy genealogy, as he shared in our text for today. (Matthew 1:1-17) Let's agree that it can be a bit tedious reading. However, he included it for a very good reason. Genealogies can be very revealing.

I read part of my genealogy one time and at one point I was surely surprised. In the 1700s a distant relative of mine who lived in England proved to be a character! On a sunny afternoon he was arrested for streaking! Can you believe it? Up to the time I read that I thought running around without any clothes on was a rather new phenomenon created by 1970's college students looking for excitement. No, I never dreamed that one of my cousins would be so far ahead of our times!

But guess what? Matthew saw Jesus' genealogy as crucial for anyone to really understand Jesus. To know his family tree helps us to know the baby Jesus and to understand why the angels sang at his birth. In juxtaposition, as I ponder my family tree and my naked cousin, I am not sure if I know my kin any better, I hope not! At the bare minimum, I must admit reading the genealogy was informative.

As we look over Matthew's genealogy, we should be reminded that in one way or another, we all come from a common source. The Genesis story of creation with the first man and woman-Adam and Eve being created is a truth uniting both science and religion. Somehow human nature had its start; somehow there was a beginning; somehow life was created and thereby began our family tree. God created all; one family tree for all.

Matthew's effort seeks to open the doors of our minds. He calls attention to the fact that our neighbors in the luxury motorhomes here at Virginia Beach Campground are my sisters and brothers even though my vehicle is less than that half the size of theirs. It means that the pilots flying those navy jets screaming over us are also my sisters and brothers.

All that is to say, that we should let Matthew's genealogy cause us to ponder not only who JESUS IS, but also how we are related to one another; different classes up and down the social ladder have nothing to do with our family tree. Neither do our varied nationalities, or races, or different thoughts about God, have any effect on our family tree.

Each and every human being is either a sister or brother, a child of God; all God's children belong to God's family and that means even you who are reading this and me, we are either a brother or sister. And I love you!

The more fully we grasp the truth that all humans have ultimately a common genealogy, the easier it will be to believe that the earliest person (millions of years old) is included in our ancestry. As Genesis tells us, God did the creating.

Jesus saw no differences between rich or poor. He accepted everyone as equal no matter where they lived, the color of their skin, the language they spoke or any other variant. And He truly calls upon us to do the same.

Love your neighbor as yourself. To do so will bring you joy and peace that is a by-product of living in harmony with others. Do not let your nearest neighbor nor someone on the other side of the world distort your family tree, for we are all sons and daughters of the One Loving Creator.

Motion was made by Larry Rogers, seconded by Beth Pond to accept all reports as given. Motion was carried.

Old Business:

Decorating Committee: This committee has been formed with 8 members. The Committee will elect a chairperson.

New Business:

2023 Slate of Officers: Moderator Dennis Miller presented the 2023 Slate of Officers. The Slate is complete except for two openings on the Board of Christian Education. Motion was made by Steve Meyer, seconded by Colleen Bean to accept the 2023 Slate of Officers as presented, Motion was carried.

Fire Alarm System: The present fire alarm system is very antiquated. It did not pass inspection and will cost a lot of money to repair as is presently installed. We need a simpler system. Dennis is checking on the possibility of using several smoke detectors.

Water Damage: The Choir storage room and the Sunday School room in the basement both were damaged when some pipes burst. They are still under repair at this time. Barbara Meyer and helpers will meet this Tuesday (1/24/23) to assess the damage of music, books, robes, etc. that were in the Choir storage room.

Boiler: The boiler has also had issues recently and is under repair.

Plumbing issues: There have been multiple plumbing issues lately, especially with the bathrooms. There is a lot of iron in Castile's water. Because of infrequent use, Greg suggests the Cleaner flush the toilets at least once a week. Dennis suggested we might look into a water filter. This will be referred to the Trustees.

Bell Tower Windows: We need to repair and/or replace the 4 windows in the bell tower. There are three proposals for the Council to consider.

- 1. Keep the stained glass. It would be about \$6,500/window. They would be able to do the work in 2024. The amount per window decreased to \$2,600/window if we removed them and took them to the repair shop. There is also extra cost for rebuilding the sash around the window.
- 2. Replace the glass with acrylic. The cost is \$850/4x8 sheet. We will need two sheets. It will also be \$350/window for composite stops and labor to reinstall. The total cost for this option is

\$3,050. This work would be done by Robb's Glass from Warsaw.

3. Replace the glass with Plywood. It would be painted with crosses on the outside of each window.

Discussion and questions followed the presentation of the proposals. Motion was made by Larry Rogers, seconded by Beth Pond to accept Proposal #2 from Robb's Glass in the color blue. Quinn Bellamy is our contact with Robb's Glass.

Stained Glass Windows: Temporary Pastor Tammy would like us to prayerfully consider what to do with the Stained-glass windows when they are removed.

Dumpster: The church will rent a dumpster in the Spring. We will have a work party to clean out several items that are no longer used or needed.

Piano: The small piano in the entryway by the wheelchair ramp may be donated. Ron Lathan will inquire if it is wanted by a Silver Lake organization.

Paint: There are several cans of paint in the basement. Sherman-Williams in Geneseo will dispose of them 5 gallons at a time. They will not take oil-based paint. Please stop and take some if you are going to Geneseo.

The next church council meeting will be April 23, 2023 immediately following the church service. Motion was made by Steve Meyer, seconded by Barb Meyer to adjourn. Motion was carried.

Meeting adjourned at 11:58 AM with the Lord's Prayer led by Temporary Pastor Tammy Lathan.
